



## **BIBL 2202 – Story of the Old Testament**

## **Course Description:**

This course explores God's story from creation through Israel's return from exile and looks forward towards God's future for humanity. It will consider essential scriptures concerning God's love, plan, and promises as revealed in the Old Testament as well as principles for interpreting these scriptures.

### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Identify and locate various Old Testament cities, countries and geographical features.
- 2. Describe different styles of literature in the Old Testament and how that impacts interpretation.
- 3. Develop a foundational knowledge of God's story with His creation as revealed in the Old Testament and its relevance for Christians today who are seeking God.
- 4. Able to identify the major themes (God's steadfast love declared through Creation, Exodus, Covenant, Law, Land and Exile); and time periods of the Old Testament (Beginnings, Patriarchal Age, Egyptian Bondage, Wilderness Wanderings, Conquest of Canaan, Judges, United Kingdom, Divided Kingdom, Judah alone, Babylonian Exile, Restoration of Jerusalem.)
- 5. In support of the University Learning Outcomes of both Active Faith and Personal, Social and Global Stewardship: Students will have the opportunity to understand their role in God's continuing story as they read much of the Old Testament and learn of God's steadfast love.

#### **Course Requirements**

## 1. Class Preparedness and Participation (10%)

Students are expected to attend and actively participate in discussions and other activities. Excellent participation requires perfect attendance and a demonstrated knowledge of assigned readings. Each absence will result in a zero for the daily and quiz grade.

#### 2. Quizzes (15%)

Quizzes, covering assigned readings, will be given at the beginning of most class meetings. These will assess your retention of the reading material and ensure thoughtful comments during the class time. The quizzes will be multiple-choice and short answer.

#### 3. Memory Work (10%)

Students will be expected to know key verses as well as the Books of the Old Testament. Memorization will be evaluated on various quizzes as well as the Final Exam.

## 4. Effectively Communicating the Old Testament (25%) Choose one:

#### a. Old Testament Reaction Essay

Students will write an essay that explores a specific story of the Old Testament and how it relates to one of the major themes of the OT and God's overall story. The essay must be a minimum of 5 full pages, double-spaced, and typed in a 12 point standard font and should use standard margins. The essay must not exceed 8 full pages. Possible topics and additional guidelines will be handed out in class.

### b. Old Testament Reaction Multi-Media Presentation

Students will prepare a presentation containing some combination of drama, art, music, and/or visual presentation of information (Poster, PowerPoint, Banner) that explores a specific story of the Old Testament and how it relates to one of the major themes of the OT and God's overall story. The project will be presented to the full class at a time concurrent with the date the essay is due. Possible formats and length must be approved by the Instructor prior to beginning the project.

#### 5. Exams (40%)

The two exams will cover the readings, lectures, and class discussion. They will be multiple choice, matching, short answer, and essay. The Mid-Term is worth 20% of the course grade. The final exam will be comprehensive and is worth 20% of the course grade. Students must bring a blue essay book to the exams.

#### **Course Policies**

#### 1. Academic Honesty Policy:

#### 2. Late Work Policy:

Assignments will be considered late if not turned in to me at the beginning of class on the day it is due. Assignments that are late will be deducted 5% of the grade for each day that it is late (excluding Sundays). Work that is more than 7 days late will not be accepted for any points.

Exams: The opportunity to make up exams will not be granted automatically and are only available at my discretion. Make-up exams may be entirely essay. If the make-up exam is not completed within the specified time the student will receive a "0" for the exam. There are two legitimate reasons for missing an exam: extreme illness and urgent personal emergency. Both must be verified by an outside source (i.e. written doctor note). Please note that travel arrangements, attending weddings or family gatherings are not acceptable reasons for missing an exam.

#### 3. Classroom and Electronic Etiquette Policy:

Students are expected to be on time to class and actively engaged to create a healthy learning environment. I view this as being respectful of both myself and your fellow students.

- a. Tardiness is disruptive and reduces your participation grade.
